





Under ten per cent of the "eligible legislators" actively participate in any discussion, whatsoever. Who is responsible for this? The remaining ninety per cent. Mr. Average Citizen denies himself his given right of free speech for no apparent reason. There are many people who can't even muster up enough strength to raise their hand to vote.

As the town meeting progresses another undesirable situation is observed with amazing facility. This is the lack of enthusiasm which is exemplified by the crude manner in which the meeting has been prepared. Question after question was showered upon the various responsible officials of the town. The most popular reply to these important questions was, "I don't believe I recollect. This matter should have been looked into before the meeting." The only explicable reason which can possibly be given as an excuse for these unsatisfactory answers is lack of an important element, enthusiasm.

However this situation is far from being dire or hopeless and many steps could be taken to promote personal interest. The first important step to be taken is the adopting of a correct and strict parliamentary procedure; thus eliminating much unnecessary chaos. This in turn would lead to a faster, more interesting meeting. Next the people themselves have a high barrier which they must hurdle unassisted. This is the everpresent obstruction, the lack of selfconfidence. At the typical town meeting it is not hard to have important opinions wasted because someone didn't have the courage to make himself heard and understood.

By now you have probably deduced that I believe that the town meeting to be all wrong. This is quite contrary to my actual belief. For although I think that it would be possible to make many changes for the better, I also assert that there is no substitute for the pleasure which emerges from the feeling of selfgovernment.






