# **Bowley Family**

By 1630, Falmouth's boundaries encompassed the present day cities of Portland, South Portland, Westbrook and Cape Elizabeth. In 1765, Cape Elizabeth (then including South Portland) was set off. In 1786, Portland broke away followed in 1814 by Westbrook.

It appears Gideon first came to Cape Elizabeth where he married then moved to Bristol by 1779. By C/1790, he was living in Sandy River Plantation later known as Unity Plantation then incorporated as New Sharon. In C/1800 he still lived in New Sharon but according to "Early Settlers of Weld" by E. J. Foster, soon after he followed his sons William and Oliver to Weld who had moved there in 1803. Gideon was soon joined in Weld by his other sons John, Benjamin, and Isaac. They erected a saw mill and a grist mill at the foot of Webb's Pond the next year living near the mills. It was around this same time his other son Joseph Bowley moved to Hartland.

According to Foster, some of the Bowley sons (unnamed in the reference) moved to Ohio following the Mormans in 1840 but the information is unconfirmed.

In his 1913 Will, he left most of his estate of some \$35,000 to his 4 living siblings however at the time of his death only his brothers John & Winfield were alive to inherit it.

Joshua moved from Hartland to Victoria in December of 1865 after Amy's death with his surviving daughters Sarah and Mary. They traveled via the Isthmus of Panama to join his sons Sewell Prescott Moody and Thomas Gage Moody.

"Still another familiar face will be missed from the little band of hardy pioneers whose ranks daily grow smaller and more scattered. Joshua Moody died at his home on Pandora Avenue at a late hour last night, after an illness of several weeks duration. The deceased was a native of Massachusetts, coming from Newburyport, and was in his 86th year, the greater portion of his busy life being spent in Victoria, where he accumulated considerable property interests, and where he leaves a numerous family, the majority of whom have grown up and taken their places as the heads of families in the city of their birth." ~ The Daily Colonist - January 4, 1894

Sewell moved to Vancouver in the late 1850s with his brother Thomas Gage Moody who was also a lumber merchant. "Sew" Moody founded Moodyville in British Columbia (eventually becoming North Vancouver) and was the principle owner of the Moodyville Sawmill Company. He went down with the 'S.S. Pacific' off the coast of Cape Flattery in Washington in 1875.

"On the morning of November 4, 1875, "Sew" Moody boarded the S.S. Pacific along with some 275 other passengers and freight in Victoria, British Columbia for the regular run to San Francisco steered by Captain Jefferson Howell. Loaded to the gunwales and listing badly, efforts to right the ship included filling lifeboats with water to bring her to trim, and then doing the same with the lifeboats on the other side to re-compensate when the vessel began to list too heavily in the opposite direction.

Around 8pm that evening, 12 miles off the coast of Washington State near Cape Flattery, the S.S. Pacific and the S.S. Orpheus collided. Both vessels continued on their course and the captain of the Orpheus later testified he was unaware of the collision. With only a few lifeboats usable, some crew joined what women had managed to get into one. None of the lifeboat parties survived, and went down soon after many of the 300-odd people struggling in the cold water went down, the women first among them because of the heavy, elaborate clothing then in fashion. An estimated 20 survived the sinking and managed to survive a while by clinging to large pieces of wreckage, and all but two of these eventually succumbed to hypothermia, as did one of the remaining pair, leaving Henry Jelley as the only one of two survivors, the other survivor was a crewman, Neil Henley.

No lifeboat drills were held, and at a subsequent inquest it was revealed that even if the lifeboats had been available for use, only 145 passengers could have been saved, with at least another 155 left on board to go down with the ship (the official estimate of the number of passengers was 275 but didn't include children or additional passengers picked up later). In terms of fatalities, the foundering of the S. S. Pacific is among the worst maritime calamities ever recorded on the Pacific Coast.

In addition to Captain Howell, who had been a Confederate Naval officer as well as the brother-in-law of the Confederacy's President, Jefferson Davis, there were several notable persons in British Columbia history among the casualties. Along with Sewell Moody were Captain Otis Parsons who had just sold off his fleet of Fraser River steamers, and J. H. Sullivan who had been Gold Commissioner of the Cassiar Mining District. Most of the freight was coal and potatoes.

Among the floating wreckage was a broken post with this inscription:

The handwriting was identified as that of Sewell Prescott Moody. It is supposed that when he found the ship going down and no hope remained of saving his life, Mr. Moody wrote this "message from the sea" on the stanchion on the faint hope that it might someday be picked up, and his fate known. His body was never recovered. The inscripted post was later donated by the Moody Family to the British Columbia Maritime Museum where is on display."

"The death occurred yesterday evening of Mrs. Moody, relict of the late Sewell P. Moody, who was interested in the Moodyville Sawmill and who was one of the victims of the Pacific disaster. The deceased lady was a native of Greenock, Scotland, but came to British Columbia in the very early days with her parents. Two children, Mrs. B.S. Oddy and Mr. S.P. Moody survive her."

Sewell Prescott Moody was designated a person of National Historical Significance by the Canadian Federal Government in 2002. The plaque below was dedicated in his honor which reads:

"In the 1860s & 1870s, Sewell Moody became the first entrepreneur to engage in the export of British Columbia lumber on a successful and continuing basis. From his mill on the North Shore of Burrard Inlet, this shrewd businessman established new shipping routes to deliver British Columbia lumber around the world, developing markets in California, Hawaii, Peru, China, Australia, New Zealand and Great Britain. Moody's accomplishments benefited this growing industry and helped establish the Harbour of Burrard Inlet as Canada's principle port on the Pacific."





He came to Victoria in 1862 and became the 9th Mayor of the City of Victoria in 1873. He was once Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, A.F. & A.M., and in 1887 was appointed by the Grand Lodge of Canada as Representative of their Grand Lodge of British Columbia.

"No death has occurred in Victoria for a long time that has created so deep and painful a feeling of regret as that of Mrs. Dalby. The flag at City Hall was displayed at half-mast during the day as a mark of respect to the memory of the deceased". ~ The Daily Colonist - March 10, 1886

He died with the sinking of the 'Princess Sophia' while on his way back to Victoria from Ruby, Alaska.

"On October 25, 1918 the 'S.S. Princess Sophia' sank with the loss of all aboard after grounding on Vanderbilt Reef in Lynn Canal near Juneau, Alaska. With 343 or more people dying in the incident, the wreck of the Sophia was the worst maritime accident in the history of British Columbia and Alaska. The circumstances of the wreck were controversial as some felt that all aboard could have been saved."
