

Whiting Family

The Whiting Family first came to the New World in 1636 and by the time John Whiting III settled in Hartland around 1806, he brought with him a long and storied family history of early New England pioneers and revolutionists. His ancestor's reputations and influences were well known throughout the religious, political and revolutionary factors of the young expanding regions of New England.

He received degrees in England from Emmanuel College (1616) and Cambridge University (1620) with a Doctorate of Divinity. He arrived in Boston, Massachusetts from England on May 26, 1636 with his 2nd wife, their son Samuel Whiting, Jr and his daughter from his first marriage. He became the Pastor at the First Church of Lynn where he remained for 43 years until his death.

Reverend Samuel Whiting, Jr graduated from Harvard University in 1653. He moved to Billerica in 1758 and by 1763 was an ordained minister remaining there for almost 50 years until his death. They had 10 children; 7 sons and 3 daughters. Only 4 of his sons lived to adulthood.

John married Margaret in either Hartland or Norridgewock but by the birth of their 2nd child in 1808, they were living in West Hartland and were listed there on the 1810 Census, still known then as Plantation #3. They remained in West Hartland the rest of their lives with John noted in the 1820, 1830 and 1840 Census Reports. John's birth record from Billerica, Massachusetts matches exactly to his age at the time of his death on his grave stone. The record also indicates his parents' names.

Following John's death, Margaret was living in the household of Samuel & Permelia Merrifield in West Hartland in C/1850 noted at 68yrs old and a "Pauper" along with her son Benjamin listed at 28yrs old and noted as "Pauper & Idiot". Margaret's father was an early settler of the area as noted below.

"Lovell Fairbrother (Sr) came to the Kennebec at an early day and explored this river and the Seabasticook; found choice intervale at or near the fork of that river, and abundance of fish in the river and game in the forest. He therefore pitched his tent a big camp near the forks of the river in 1775 and

moved his family there being joined by two others and this commenced the settlement in what is now the prosperous town of Pittsfield, then called Sebasticook Plantation." Margaret's nephew Franklin Newall Fairbrother married Mary Withee, a daughter of Uzziel Withee. (See Withee Family)

*It is difficult to determine with any certainty exactly what role John had in the Revolutionary War. The few indisputable documents include his Revolutionary War Pension Records showing he served as a Private for which he received \$96 annually (monthly \$8 payments) which began on April 10, 1818 and continued until his death in 1846. In a supplemental report based on the 1840 U. S. Census, John is listed as one of two surviving Revolutionary War Veterans in Hartland along with Uzziel Withee. No less than a dozen soldiers from Massachusetts named "John Whiting" appear throughout the war records but many details, such as age and hometown, are sketchy. We do know his cousin Timothy Whiting, Sr along with his sons Timothy, Jr and John, marched from Billerica to Concord on April 19, 1775 and fought in the infamous battle there and in Lexington which began the Revolutionary War. Cousin John was a Colonel at the time (eventually becoming a Lt.-General serving directly under George Washington) so it is **possible** the following information pertains to John Whiting III's service as a Private and not that of his famous higher ranking cousin.*

From the Report of Revolutionary War Service; Volume 17, Page 171:

Whiting, John; Billerica, Massachusetts

Private in Captain Jonathan Stickney's Company, Colonel Ebenezer Bridge's 27th Regiment of Minutemen, which marched on the alarm (at Concord) of April 19, 1775; service, 6 days.

also, Fifer, Capt. Stickney's Company, Col. Bridge's 27th Regiment; receipt for advance pay, signed by said Whiting and others, dated Cambridge, June 26, 1775.

also, Same Company and Regiment; muster roll dated Aug. 1, 1775; enlisted April 25, 1775; service, 3 mos. 14 days.

also, Company return dated Cambridge, Oct. 25, 1775.

also, Order for bounty coat or its equivalent in money dated Cambridge, Nov. 16, 1775.

also, List of men raised for Continental service from 7th Middlesex Co. Regiment, as returned by Capt. Edward Farmer; residence, Billerica; engaged for town of Billerica; joined Capt. Danforth's Co., Col. Brewer's Regt.; term, 3 years or during war.

*In 1774, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts General Court granted New Suncook Plantation in the Province of Maine to the officers and soldiers (or their heirs) who fought on May 8, 1725 during Father Rale's War (aka Lovewell's War) against the Sokokis Abenaki Natives at Pequawket (now Fryeburg, Maine). First settled in 1777, the community had 85 inhabitants by 1790. New Suncook Plantation was incorporated as the town of Lovell on November 15, 1800, renamed for Captain Jonathan Lovewell, the fallen expedition leader. **Samuel Whiting** (as noted above, the son of Samuel and nephew of Oliver) was wounded during the same engagement which killed Captain Lovewell but survived his wounds.*

*Following the end of the Revolutionary War, several members of the Whiting Family who were related to **Samuel Whiting**, as noted above, took advantage of the heir's land offering in New Suncook, Maine and removed there. Although the exact date they came there is unknown, the 1st U. S. Census of 1790 shows John III, his brothers Joshua and Oliver and his sister Lucy living there. They were all still living there in the newly incorporated town now known as Lovell in the 1800 Census with John noted as a Head of Household, single, between 25-44 years old. (He was 43 years old at the time.)*

Leonard moved to California in 1852 and settled in Nevada County where he mined for gold and operated lumber mills for many years. Leonard is last found in C/1880 in Nevada City living next to his son Silas noted as a Lumberman at 72yrs old and widowed.

"Silas O. Whiting has mined in all the prominent camps on the Salmon and while he has property interests in various places especially around Florence, he has his permanent headquarters at Mt. Idaho. He was born in Somerset County, Maine on April 14, 1837, the son of Leonard and Hannah (Dyer) Whiting. The father, who was born in Maine in 1808, was a stone cutter and his father (John) was a native of Massachusetts, settling in Maine among the first pioneers and was also a patriot in the Revolution. Leonard Whiting came to California in 1852 and settled in Nevada County, where he mined and operated mills for many years. Silas was educated in his native place and worked on the farm until he was twenty-two (1859) when he came to Nevada County, California where he remained for thirty years, freighting and mining.

In 1889 he came to the vicinity of Cheney, Washington, then to Spokane and engaged in lumbering for three years. In 1895 he removed to Idaho County and went on mining in the Pierce District. Then he came to Canas Prairie and rented a farm near Grangeville. Two years later he came to Florence, where he has operated much of the time since. He was watchman of the Poorman Mine and was one year and a half at the Blossom. In the meantime he was interested in Bear Creek Country and had a share in the famous Kimberly and Jewell, which recently sold for \$65,000. He now owns independent claims in the Jewell group. He also has property on one of the best leads there, has a third interest in the Gold Lake placer in Florence.

In 1864, in Nevada City, California, Mr. Whiting married Miss Maria Buzzell, who was born in Penobscot County, Maine. Four children were born to this union, two of whom are still living; Bertrand D. and Nellie Everland, both in San Francisco. Mr. Whiting is a master Mason, joining the lodge in 1864, and is a Republican. Mr. Whiting has had much experience in the various camps of California and he believes the Bear Creek District is ahead of any of them." ~ An Illustrated History of North Idaho - 1903

Bryce & Elizabeth left Hartland soon after C/1860 for California with some of their surviving younger children. He was committed by a Judge to Stockton, California State Insane Asylum in 1870 for "abnormal and extravagant actions and homicidal tendencies" but was released in 1872. She was living in West Bear River, Yuba, California C/1870 in the household of her daughter Elizabeth (Morrill) Oakley.

They were living in Garland in C/1850 with their 2 oldest children John & Abbie and her 2 daughters from her 1st marriage Francina & Paulina Spearin. They remained in Garland in C/1860 with their 4 children and Francina just before she married. Alden enlisted for the war in Garland noted at 40yrs old and married and mustered into service on October 10, 1862. He was taken Prisoner of War in June of 1863 in Port Hudson, Louisiana but eventually released and mustered out of service in September of 1863.

At some point between 1860 and 1863, they divorced and Alden remarried to Sarah F. Hodgdon (1841-1913) and was living in Orland in C/1870 with her and their 6yr old son Abram, the oldest of their 3 children born to them followed by Annie in 1873 & Henry in 1877. They moved to Bangor by C/1880 where he had begun collecting an invalid war pension in 1879 and reported his matching service record in the 1890 Census Veterans Addendum. They were still living in Bangor in C/1910 just before moving to his hometown of Brighton. Following his death, Sarah began collecting his death pension until her death a year later.

After they divorced, Sarah remained in Garland listed in C/1870 as Sarah B. Ellis, 45yrs old and Head of Household with her sons John at 25yrs & Edward at 19yrs living with her. She was living with her married daughter Paulina (Spearin) Towle in Dover in C/1880 listed as Sarah B. Ellis at 65yrs old just before her death and reported as a Widow although Alden was still living.
