They moved from Turner to Hartland, then still part of St Albans, in December of 1825 where they married and he continued his medical practice for some forty years. He owned a large area of land adjacent to the Academy which part of became Blake Street named posthumously in his honor in 1897. He was on the original Board of Directors of St Albans/Hartland Academy in 1832 and was greatly involved with both town's politics before and after the respective town line changes in 1846. He also owned a large area of land further down Academy Street which included a section of future Commercial Street eventually sold as individual lots by himself and his son Calvin. At an unknown date, but by 1860, Dr. Blake built a large house on Academy Street near the corner of Commercial Street which was owned by three generations of family until 1945. Louisa's brother Peleg C. Haskell moved to the area around the same time settling on future Commercial Street. (See Dr. Blake Biographical Dedication at bottom)

Their children's names and birth dates were recorded in St Albans Vital Records as their residence on Academy Street was part of St Albans until 1846 when it was annexed to become part of Hartland.

She remained there living with her widowed sister-in-law Jeanette (Turner) Blake in Hartland in C/1910.

His name was noted in Palmyra Vital Records as the son of George & Mary Lancey. They lived in Hartland after they married and took over her father Dr. Calvin Blake's original house on Academy Street next to the Academy. By 1860, he was operating a dry goods store at an unknown location in Hartland before he built a new building in 1875 near the corner of Academy Street and Commercial Street (future B. W. Hanson Store) where he operated his store until his death.

Annie first arrived from Scotland in New York City on December 9, 1864 on the 'Caledonia' at 3yrs old with her father, maternal grandmother and siblings then proceeded to their final destination in Hartland. Annie was raised in the household of her Uncle Archibald & Aunt Grace Linn living with them in C/1870 & C/1880 after arriving in Hartland with her family.

By 1886, he took over the business previously operated by his late father George Lancey, Jr near the corner of Commercial Street & Academy Street and began operating as G. M. Lancey Dry Goods & Groceries and moved into the upstairs apartment with Annie.

In September of 1920, he sold his store block to Perley & Bertie Hanson who eventually operated it as B. W. Hanson Clothing Store. Following the sale, George & Annie moved

into his late Uncle Calvin Blake's house on Academy Street where he continued selling insurance until his retirement in 1942 just before his death.

As noted in her obituary, "She was married twice, her first husband having been the cousin of her second choice. He met a tragic death (April 10, 1865) while firing a cannon salute at (General) Lee's surrender celebration." The unnamed first husband was Daniel Wilson Blake (1835-1865), a son of Daniel Briggs Blake, the brother of Dr. Calvin Blake.

They lived with his parents on Academy Street and took over the house upon his father's death in 1870. Calvin, as he was known throughout his life, was active in town affairs serving as Town Treasurer, Town Constable and Town Selectman. He operated a store on Main Street in 1860 at the future Randlett-Tapley store location. He sold several lots of his father's land on Commercial Street which became stores. He also sold several lots adjacent to the Academy in the 1890s and early 1900s which were developed with new houses and became Blake Street in 1897.

Following Calvin's death, Jeanette remained at the house with her sister-in-law Hattie Blake. Following Jeanette's death, his nephew George Merrill Lancey moved into the house in 1920. It was sold to Lewis H. Barden in 1945 after G. M.'s death.

Biographical Sketch of Dr. Calvin Blake

"Dr. Calvin Blake was born in Turner, Maine on September 5, 1798. He was one of the numerous self-made men of the community, who, without a liberal education, have arisen by their own energy and exertions, to positions of wide influence and usefulness; and by his skill, ability and benevolence, he secured the confidence, respect and love of a large circle of friends.

He received the rudiments of his early education at the district schools at Turner, and was engaged in the usual labors of a farm during his boyhood. He afterwards taught school to defray the expenses incurred while preparing for his chosen profession. He commenced the study of medicine with his uncle, Dr. Silas Blake, of Harrison, Maine, where he remained the first eighteen months of his studies; attended his first course of medical lectures at Dartmouth; returned home and became the pupil of the late Dr. Timothy Little, then an active practitioner at New Gloucester, Maine; graduated at the Medical School of Maine, in November 1824, and commenced practice at Hartland, Maine, in December the following year, where he remained in active practice for forty-two years, with an energy and success which few have equaled.

In January 1826, he married Miss Louisa Haskell, of New Gloucester, Maine, a woman of intellect and strength of character, who lived to cheer him in the performance of his varied duties and nurse him in his last sickness. He lay in a helpless condition from the fall of 1866, at which time he was stricken down with an attack of paralysis, till October 8, 1870, and fell asleep to wake no more on earth, but passed, we trust, to a merciful God and a glorious immortality.

During the four years he lay sick and palsied, no man could be more patient. He became a firm believer in the Christian religion, asking praying men to pray with him, and when his speech became so impaired that he could talk no more, he would point to the Bible, and by signs get them to read and pray, that he might listen to the promise of God to the humble and penitent sinner.

He was most assuredly a good and practical physician, possessing an active mind, disciplined by study and an extensive practice; quick in his decisions; promptly resorting to bold and heroic treatment when necessity required prompt measures to be taken. As an obstetrician none excelled him. In consultation he was honorable and gentlemanly, seeking to promote the welfare of both patient and physician. Though stern and decided in his deportment, he possessed a heart as tender as a child. The cheat, the impostor and quack, he hated with bitter hatred. In his death the community feels that they have met with an irreparable loss."
