Revolutionary War

s/o Joseph Hubbard & Sarah Emery (Old Fields Road Cemetery, South Berwick) b. 1755 Berwick d. 11 Sep 1808 Shapleigh (possibly buried w/parents but unconfirmed) ae 53yrs m. 21 Feb 1777 Kitterv Mehitable Underwood d/o John Underwood & Mary Deering b. c1759 Kittery d. 1 July 1846 Corinna (possibly buried w/Philip but unconfirmed) ae 87yrs "Philip, the sixth child and fifth son of Joseph and Sarah (Emery) Hubbard, was baptized in Berwick, Maine, on September 14, 1755. Philip, along with several of his brothers and first cousins (including another Philip, with whom he should not be confused), served in the early years of the Revolutionary War. He initially enlisted about May 20, 1775 in the company commanded by his Uncle Captain Philip Hubbard within Colonel James Scammon's 30th Regiment. As a member of that unit, he served for eight months at Cambridge, Massachusetts then went home for a month. He enlisted again in Captain Philip Hubbard's company as a private and served at Kittery Point "for defence of the seacoast" from January 22, 1776 to December 31, 1776. For the last month and a half of that period (beginning November 14th),

he was in Sergeant Moses Hubbard's detachment at Kittery Point."

"Philip settled in Kittery and resided there for about twenty years. Described as a Mariner, he eventually purchased land in Kittery on November 26, 1795, but sold that tract on February 6, 1798 and soon moved to Shapleigh. Although he is not found there in the 1800 Census, he was in that town by November 28, 1799 when one of his daughters married there. Philip was only in his early fifties when he died in Shapleigh on September 11, 1808. The location of his grave is unknown/unconfirmed."

"On August 21, 1809, his widow, Mehitable, was appointed Administrator of his estate, valued at \$427.50 and including his twenty-five-acre homestead farm in Shapleigh. Mehitable was still living in Shapleigh in 1820 when she headed a household that included her youngest son and daughter. Sometime in the 1820s, she accompanied her daughter Sarah and son-in-law when they moved first to Waterville by 1830 and then to Corinna by 1840." ~ Edward G. Hubbard

They were living in Shapleigh in C/1810 with their oldest child and were still living there in C/1820. They were living in Waterville by C/1830 and had moved to Canaan by C/1840 then to Palmyra by C/1850. They remained in Palmyra living with their son George in C/1860 who had taken over the homestead on South Ridge Road. Phillip was still living with George in C/1870 following Mary's death. The date of his death from 'old age' was noted on the 1880 Census Mortality Schedule.

They were living in Bangor in C/1850. He remarried and was living in Palmyra Village in 1860.
She was not mentioned in her sister Annie's Will as both her children had also predeceased her.

They were living in Bangor in C/1850 after they married where he was noted as a merchant. She never remarried and moved to Wisconsin by C/1860 then to Chicago by C/1870. She amassed a substantial fortune as a dressmaker and several real estate holdings in Chicago which she bequeathed in her March 23, 1901 Will to numerous members of her extended surviving Hubbard & Lancey family. Her Will stated she was to be cremated and her ashes buried with her husband Confucius Lancey in the old village cemetery in Palmyra, Maine in his parent's lot.

Her long and detailed Will named numerous Hubbard family members noting their relationship to her including her deceased father and deceased siblings and their surviving children to whom she left substantial monetary inheritances ranging from \$50 to \$500. Most of her large real estate holdings in Chicago were left to Mrs. Anna (Hubbard-Lancey) Hetherington (1873-1959) whom she adopted as her daughter by 1880.

They were living in Palmyra by C/1840. He was noted as a shoemaker in C/1850 & C/1860 at their
homestead located in Palmyra Village. They built a new home around 1870 on the future Hubbard Road
off the Newport side of US RT 2 in Palmyra where their son Confucius and his family later moved in with
them in their elderly years to care for them until their respective deaths. They would send 4 sons to serve
in the Civil War with the youngest never returning home. Keziah was the oldest living person in Palmyra
at the time of her death at 98 years, 3 months, 17 days. (See bottom for additional related articles)

6 known children. (C/1910 notes 6 children born, 4 living)

They were living in Greene in C/1860 with their oldest child Alma before moving to Palmyra by 1861 where their children John, Olive, George and Sarah were born. They lost Olive in 1864. They were still living in Palmyra in C/1870 just before George died in June of 1872 and their last child Fred was born in September of 1872. By C/1880, the 3 oldest surviving children had been taken in as boarders in other households and Rhoda reported herself as a Widow living in Palmyra as a boarder with Fred. She continued to report herself as a Widow in each Census up until her death in 1916. Her stone at Greenwood Cemetery, Greene is engraved as the wife of C. H. Hubbard, likely added by her surviving daughter Sarah (Hubbard) Lawrence. Their other daughter Alma would marry Gideon Corson, a son of Charles' Aunt Caroline (Hubbard) Corson.

Despite her ongoing reported Widow status, there is some <u>circumstantial</u> evidence the marriage ended instead in an unamiable separation/divorce. Charles, referred to in his Aunt Annie Lancey's 1901 Will as "My brother Phillip (Hubbard) had a son Charles, his whereabouts unknown, his wife Rhoda still living in Maine", <u>may</u> be the same Charles H. Hubbard living in Maidstone, Vermont in C/1880, born in Maine and remarried to Mary Perry about 1872. They were living in Orford, New Hampshire in C/1900. He had at least 6 more children with Mary including a daughter Rose whose death certificate noted her father's birthplace as Palmyra, Maine. His August 25, 1904 death certificate in Orford also coincides with Rhoda's Civil War Widow Death Pension filing on December 9, 1904 matching his service record.

An engraving on her parent's family monument at Judkins Cemetery reads "Ellen F. Wood, Dau. of Phillip & Kezia Hubbard, d. Dec. 20, 1862 at 25yrs old" suggesting her birth to be about 1837 however Census records indicate she was born in 1849. She was listed as Ellen F. Hubbard living with her parents and siblings in Palmyra in C/1850 taken in September at 10mths old and again in Palmyra in C/1860 taken in June at 9yrs old. It is doubtful she married at 10-12yrs old and more likely an incorrect death year was provided when the engraving was made many years after her death when the monument was erected for her parents. No records of her death or marriage have been found thus far.

Following Hattie's death, he moved to Hartland with their children where he operated a Blacksmith Shop in the basement floor of the Hartland Grain & Grocery Storage Building on Main Street. He remained in Hartland until he moved to Madison about 1948 living with his son Homer in C/1950 until his death.

94 Article on Phillip & Keziah Hubba AN AGED Cot PLE.—Mr. Phillip Hubbard and wife are visiting at the home of a daugh-ter, Mrs. Conoly, of this village. There is no aged couple who are better known or held in greater esteem in this section of the two counties than "U ncle" Phillip and "Aunt" Kezla Hubbard. Mr. Hubbard was born in Lelan n. near the New Hampshire line, and Isnow S5 years of age. Mrs. Hubbard was born in Bruuswick and her heavy head of hair is as white as the snow of her 53 winters. When young people they located in Palmyra where they have since been identified with the best interests of the town. Mr. Hubbard has always been a lover of the chase and has followed the hounds hundred- of miles. He was the hero of the capture of two moose about the year 1830, in the then town of West W aterville, now Oskland, and was an earnest participant in the capture of the moose at Waterville, now Oakland, and was an earnest participant in the capture of the moose at Palmyra in 18-11. He persistently followed this last animal for five days before he was surrounded in the small piece of woods. In the poem by John Harvey his name appears as "Shoemaker Hubbard whose aim is so true." For many years he was the champion fox hunter in this section and there is no doubt but what "I'ncle Phil" has been the death of more of the Reynard family than any other man in Somerset county during the twenty years previous to 1885. Age precludes his following the hounds now but there is nothing that will start all the nerve of his boyhood quicker than to have them there is nothing that will start all the nerve of his boyhood quicker than to have them cross his wood-lot, baying at every bound. Mrs. Hubbard is a smart woman for her age, and the lustre of her eye is in no wise dim. The mother of ten children. four girls and six boys always kept her hand busy till they were of age, and those habits of industry have never left her. She was making a crazy quilt for a great grandchild when we called yesterday. Four of her boys were in the army and the mother has received a pen-sion from one that died in the service till last June under the dependent pension act. But the commissioner of pensions has seen fit to let the axe fall and cut oil this sum of \$12 per month, which to these old people means a good deal in the way of necessaries and com-forts or life; needed much more in the future good deal in the way of necessaries and com-forts or life; needed much more in the future than in the past. We sincerely hope the time will come when justice shall be done these aged people, (who are not alone in the sweeping act) and the pittance of a pension restored to this mother who furnished four sons to help save our country when in its peril. About twenty-five years ago they moved from Paimyra village and commenced the making of a small farm near the castern part of the town. Mr.#Uubbard erected a moved from Palmyra village and commenced the making of a small farm near the eastern part of the town. Mr.gtlubbard erected a house and made a clearing, and as they were frugal people, secured to themselves a com-fortable home where they were enabled to live happily and peacefully as long as health would permit them to attend to the various duties of farm life. But the intimities of age precluded this and the youngest son has now taken the farm and cares for the old folks. Thus goes the world. This son that was but a boy when his brother died in the army must come to the rescue, and although surrounded by a family of his own he as-sumes the additional cares of the paternal home. But he will do it cheerfully and with health will succeed in the undertaking. The old folks are able as yet to assist in many ways in the various duties of the family; but when the "shadows are all the longer grown" it will be different. Mr. and Mrs. Hubbsrd are now in the enjoyment of good health for people of their age. It is the sincere hope of their many, many friends that they may con-tinue on till the close of the present century, and longer if God wills it should be so. But let the time come whenever it may they will be ready to meet it for they can look back upon a well-ordered life, void of oliense tobe ready to meet it for they can look back upon a well-ordered life, void of oitense toward God or man."

1909 Obituary of Keziah Hubbard

Keziah M Hubbard, or Grandmama, as we all called her She was the oldest person in town, being un years, 3 months, 17 days She passed peacefully away after a short illness of ten weeks on July 5 She was loved by all who knew her and in years past if there was sukness or trouble she was always ready and willing to aid all with help or advice Mrs. Hubbard requested her youngest son, Confueins Hubbard, and wife to care for her jin her dechuing years and they have teuderly cared for her Mrs. Hubbard has devoted her whole time to her care, giving up social privileges. About one year ago Mrs Hubbard's health began to fail and her evesight failed; previous to that she used to do fine sewing and read a great deal and also make lace Many of her friends have samples of her fine needle work which they highly prize Mrs. Hubbard was the widow of Philip Hubbard, whose death occurred several years ago Since my remembrance they have always lived on the farm where she spent her last days. She was the mother of ten children. She lost one son in the war and is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Caroline Spollett of Palmyra, Mrs. Mary J. Murray and Mrs Thomas Conley of Richmond, and three sons, Orlando of Branswick and Charles who lives in Maine, and Confucius, who resides on the old homestead. Services were conducted by Rev. J W Webster of Newport at the home. There, was a profusion of flowers, the casket being covered beside several large pieces, a sickle by P. of H, she being a member of Palmyra Grange, a large pillow "Mother," a wreath and other pieces from members of her family.
