

Moor/Moore Family

Note: Much of what is commonly acknowledged as the “historical” account of William Moor’s early years of exploration and settlement in the area before 1810 derives from traditional family lore passed down over 175+ years through generations of the Moor/Moore Family. Known documentation of this early part of the timeline is limited to only a mention of Moor’s land holdings on a couple of early maps. Like many family stories passed along and retold by subsequent generations, there are slightly varying versions of the events and the timeline which unfolded in those early years. As to exactly how much of any of the information from these early accounts is factual or endearing legend is left to the reader’s discretion.

William is historically recognized as one of Hartland’s pioneer settlers although the lot he purchased and eventually settled was originally surveyed as part of future St Albans, then known as Township No. 5 in the 1st Range North of the Waldo Patent. It would later be referred to as Berlin Township then as Fairhaven, so called, in the 1810 Census before its incorporation as the Town of St Albans in 1813.

William is thought to have first come from his native state of New Hampshire to explore the area around 1796 and to have purchased his lot soon after. No deeds or records for the exact date of his lot purchase have yet been found but his name was noted as owner of the lot on a 1797 (then) Kennebec County Map and again on a 1798 Surveyor’s Map of individual lots for Township No. 5 by Samuel Weston in preparation of Dr. John Warren’s 1799 purchase of the township.

Moor’s large lot, identified as Lot S-17 on the 1798 Weston Survey Map, was about a mile long and a half mile wide located mostly on the eastern side of the Sebec River stretching north to the end of current day Commercial Street, south to the end of current day Elm Street and east to the end of current day Academy Street. It also included a section which straddled the river and bordered Hartland to the west with that lot line running roughly along current Pittsfield Avenue.

One version of family tradition suggests William began traveling back and forth from New Hampshire bringing supplies and tools to begin improvements soon after he purchased his lot. In 1797, documents show he married Sally Moor in New Hampshire and had 2 children born to them there in 1797 & 1800.

By 1798, he is said to have built a small log dam on the Sebec River between the river island and part of his lot along the main river bank where he built a sawmill and a simple log cabin located near the future Hartland Library on what became Commercial Street. Moor is said to have used a new type of saw technology known as an “Up and Down Saw” and his sawmill referred to as “all wood but the saw”.

William is said to have returned to settle permanently on his lot around 1802 with his wife Sally and their 2 year old son James. Their oldest child Maria is thought to have been left with her maternal grandparents Abraham & Esther Moor in Norridgewock who soon after joined them at their new

settlement location. Moor is believed to have replaced their original log cabin with a stick built house and to have built a grist mill below his sawmill not long after they settled.

One part of the traditional family story, as told by Moor's Great Granddaughter Florence (Moor) Smith for a 1937 newspaper article, suggests an endearing tale of William & Sally traveling in February of 1802 from Harmony across a frozen Great Moose Lake hauling a hand sled with their 2 year old son James and "all their earthly possessions" in tow.

It is to be noted some other accounts suggest Moor did not come to his new lot at all until 1802 and made all the improvements mentioned above from that point forward, however, like the story passed along by family tradition, no documentation exists to confirm the actual events or timeline.

Regardless of the varying details of William Moor's early arrival, he was firmly settled in the area when he and his family were enumerated in the 1810 Census for Township No. 5 then referred in the Census as Fairhaven. When it incorporated as a town on June 14, 1813, St Albans' borders still included all of Moor's original lot although he had already sold much of it as individual lots to new settlers in the area.

"It is related (through family legend) that so little disturbed was the wilderness by the encroachments of settlers that at times Mr. Moor allowed the machinery in his mill to run through the night in order that it might frighten away the bears and other forest prowlers from the cattle pen which was situated on the bank of the river below the house."

Moor also had an early business interest in the neighboring township which became Corinna. An exact date is unknown but by at least 1815 he had purchased Captain Joseph Ireland's Grist & Lumber Mill in the future Corinna Village.

"Following his (1804) purchase of Corinna, Dr. John Warren later induced Captain Joseph Ireland of North Newport and his nephew, Daniel Ireland, to erect a mill at what is now Corinna Village. This mill was for both grist and lumber. The settlers paid for the grinding in grain and lumber hauled on hooping sleds. The supplies for the mill were brought on horseback from Bangor. After two years, the Irelands sold their rights to William Moor, Esq. of Hartland, and Corinna was from then until its (1815) petition for incorporation called 'Moor's Mills' which included the whole settlement at the village." ~ A Brief History of Corinna, Maine 1804-1916

William & Sally remained at their homestead in then St Albans for a few more years after his purchase of the Ireland Mills where he served as a local Justice of the Peace and called for the 1st Town Meeting of Hartland when it incorporated as a town in 1820. Soon after the 1820 Census was taken, they moved to Corinna with their 6 youngest children where they remained until their deaths. Their 2 oldest children Maria (Moor) Stinchfield and James Moor remained in the area. William Moor's entire original lot on both sides of the Sebasticook River accounted for almost all the land annexed to Hartland by Legislative Act in 1846 thus his historical inclusion as one of Hartland's pioneer settlers.

Sally's father Abraham Moor was born in 1749 in Litchfield, New Hampshire, the seventh and youngest child of Major Samuel Moor & Deborah Butterfield. Abraham & Esther first came to Madison in 1797 then moved to Old Point in Norridgewock before moving to St Albans (Hartland) soon after William & Sally settled there. The first St Albans Town Meeting was held at his house on August 9, 1813. Abraham died on February 15, 1823 and was the 1st known interment at what became known as Ireland Cemetery.

Sally's mother Esther Walker was born in Bedford, New Hampshire on April 27, 1754, the third child of Captain James Walker & Esther Goffe. Abraham and Esther were married, probably in Bedford, New Hampshire, by 1773. Esther died January 26, 1841 in St Albans (Hartland) and is interred with Abraham

at Ireland Cemetery. Esther's older sister Sally Walker married Joseph Moor, an older brother of her husband Abraham.

Sally's sister Nancy Moor married John Steward, Jr in 1816. He was a teacher earlier in his life and later a farmer. In 1846, they moved to Madison, Wisconsin with the two youngest of their six children where John died a year later on September 16, 1847. Nancy returned to Hartland where she died in 1851 and is interred at Ireland Cemetery as Nancy Steward.

Sally's sister Olive Moor married Captain Joseph Ireland who eventually moved to Hartland after 1830. They are interred together at what is now their namesake Ireland Cemetery. **(See Ireland Family)**

Note: Early Federal Census Reports from 1790 through 1840 listed only the name of the Head of Household. Those living in the household, related or not, were indicated by number only of free white males and females, including the Head of Household, in age categories which varied slightly over the years. The names of those household members *highlighted* below are presumed based on known names and birth years and are not confirmed.

In the Census of 1810, William & Sally and their children were living in Fairhaven, so called on the Census, where he is noted as "Wm. Moor" as Head of Household with the entire household listed as; 4 Males 0-10 (*James @ 10yrs old, William @ 6yrs old, Benjamin @ 4yrs old, Robert @ 2yrs old*), 1 Male 16-26 (*Unknown*), 1 Male 26-45 (*William @ 34yrs old*), 1 Female 0-10 (*Roxanna @ under 1yr old*), 1 Female 10-16 (*Maria @ 13yrs old*), 1 Female 26-45 (*Sally @ 37yrs old*). Noted in the same Census in Fairhaven as Head of Household were Sally's father Abraham Moor and her brother Samuel Moor.

In C/1820, William & Sally were still living along the Sebasticook River in the then town of St Albans incorporated in 1813 noted as "William Moor" as Head of Household with the entire household listed as; 2 Males 10-16 (*Benjamin @ 14yrs old & Robert @ 12yrs old*), 1 Male 16-18 (*William @ 16yrs old*), 2 Males 16-26 (*Possibly James @ 20yrs old & Unknown Male*), 1 Male 26-45 (*William @ 44yrs old*), 3 Females 0-10 (*Clarinda @ 4yrs old, Sarah @ 7yrs old & Roxanna @ 10yrs old*), 1 Female 16-26 (*possibly James' wife Dorcas Wiggin @ 21yrs old*), 1 Female 45 and older (*Sally @ 47yrs old*).

On March 3, 1820 William Moor, Esq., in his role as a Justice of the Peace for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, issued a Warrant to Ambrose Finson to call for the 1st official Hartland Town Meeting after it incorporated on February 7, 1820. Moor then administered the oaths of office for some of the town officers elected at that first Town Meeting held on March 13, 1820 in West Hartland.

Soon after 1820, William & Sally moved to Corinna where he is noted as "Wm. Moore, Esq." as Head of Household in C/1830 with the entire household listed as; 1 Male 10-15 (*Unknown*), 1 Male 50-60 (*William @ 54yrs old*), 1 Female 10-15 (*Clarinda @ 14yrs old*), 2 Females 15-20 (*Sarah @ 17yrs old & Roxana @ 20yrs old*), 1 Female 50-60 (*Sally @ 57yrs old*), 1 Female 70-80 (*possibly her widowed mother Esther Walker Moor @ 76yrs old?*).

In C/1840 in Corinna, William is noted as "Wm. Moor" as Head of Household with the entire household listed as; 1 Male 60-70 (*William @ 64yrs old*) and 1 Female 60-70 (*Sally @ 67yrs old*) living next to their sons Benjamin Moor & Robert Moor and their daughter Sarah (Moor) Elliott. Their son William was also noted in Corinna on same Census as "Wm. Moor". Following William's death in 1848, Sally was living with her daughter Clarinda (Moor) Robinson and her family in Corinna in C/1850 noted at 76yrs old.

Early Vital Records of St Albans include a listing for the William & Sally Moor Family with their 8 children's given names and their birth dates and are used below as reference. The record does not

include any of the children's birth places but most historical records and accounts indicate their 2 oldest children were born in New Hampshire. (See bottom for original record)

She is said by some family tradition accounts to have been left with her maternal grandparents Abraham & Esther Moor in Norridgewock when her parents permanently settled in Hartland in 1802. They moved soon after to join her parents at their new settlement location.

John & Maria were listed living in St Albans in C/1820 after they married likely in the part which later became Hartland in 1846. In C/1850, their residence was then noted as Hartland where he operated a carding mill and clothier business on the corner of Main Street and future Hubbard Avenue. He sold the homestead and carding mill to George Fairgrievies around 1868 and moved to Skowhegan with Maria who passed away shortly after. John was living with his son Calvin in Skowhegan in C/1870 noted as a widower.

He remained in Hartland for the rest of his life after his parents moved to Corinna and built his first house on Main Street likely soon after he and Dorcas married. James built the original Upper Dam on the Sebasticook River by at least 1825 where he located a sawmill on the dam and eventually a woodworking mill next to it. In 1847, a newspaper article notes he moved his original Main Street house to Pittsfield Avenue (future I. Holt home) and built a new larger house at the Main Street location which later became the site of Scott-Webb Memorial Hospital. Her parents were early settlers at Wiggin Hill and were listed on the 1810 Census in Fairhaven (St Albans). Dorcas remained at their home living with her daughter Elmeda (Moor) Webb and family until her death.

Hartland Vital Records include the given names & birthdates of their 6 oldest children as of 1830. The 4 youngest were added at a later date to the records but by first name only. A Moor Family Document

recorded by Helen Moor Smith and her mother Florence (Moor) Smith in 1932 also included the names and birth order of their 10 children (with no dates) and most of their respective spouses and children.

In 1883, Amasa produced the lumber at his sawmill and built the first dedicated Methodist Church building in Hartland. Following a major fire in January of 1885 at one of their

woodworking mills, Amasa partnered with his son Walter H. Moor(e) and built the first of 2 new mills on the future Moore Street location where they manufactured doors, sashes and blinds operating as A. J. Moor & Son Woodworking until his death.

Moore & Son Woodworking Mill on North Street located next to father's house. Walter was visiting his sister Florence (Moor) Smith in Portland when he fell dead from a heart attack at a local music store.

He was attending Hartland Academy in 1912 and 1913 with the Class of 1916 when he took a Foreman job with Burrill Manufacturing in Hartland from 1913 to 1914. He then went to Riverview Military Academy in Poughkeepsie, New York from 1914 to 1916 before attending Montclair Military Academy in New Jersey where he graduated in 1918. He had entered West Point Military Academy where he served with the Academy's U. S. Corps of Cadets from 1918 until his honorable discharge in 1919.

Following his service, Merrill worked briefly for C. A. Batchelder in St Albans from 1920 to 1922 before joining his father in late May of 1923 as a partner at the new W. H. Moore & Son Woodworking Mill on North Street which he took over following his father's death in 1931 and operated into the early 1970s. He & Buff lived with his father after they married until 1933 when they built their house on a portion of the North Street family homestead just past the mill.

Merrill was very active in town affairs throughout his life including service as Town Selectman, Hartland School Committee, President of Hartland Chamber of Commerce, President of Hartland Mills, Inc. which brought the tannery to town

and Chairman of the Sesquicentennial Committee in 1970. He was a member of several civic groups in Hartland including a Charter Member and past Commander of Hartland American Legion Post 141 and Hartland Lion's Club International. He was one of the first Scout Masters of the Boy Scout Troop in Hartland and Trustee & Board Member of Grace Linn United Methodist Church.

Bertha's parents came from Nova Scotia to Massachusetts in 1888. She graduated from Colby College Class of 1922. A family story conveys her first job out of college was at Hartland Academy. Merrill was sent to the train station to pick her up where it was "love at first sight" and their life together began. She was a member of the Outlook Club, a Trustee of the Hartland Library and had been Choir Director and Organist for the Grace Linn United Methodist Church; and also was a member of the Hartland American Legion Post 141 Auxiliary.

Shortly after Nellie & Alden married in 1885, they moved to Woonsocket, South Dakota along with her mother Clarinda where he resumed his druggist profession and was later appointed Post Master of Woonsocket on January 16, 1890.

"Woonsocket, South Dakota was developed in 1883 as a railroad town because of its location at the junction of the Chicago, Milwaukee and Santa Fe Railroads. C.H. Prior, the Superintendent of the railroad, named the town after his home town of Woonsocket, Rhode Island. The town was incorporated in 1888."

3 of Alden's older brothers enlisted with the 3rd Maine Voluntary Infantry, Company E in St Albans in June of 1861 and all died within 3 months of enlisting. Cyrus G. Sampson was Killed In Action on July 21, 1861 at the Battle of Bull Run at 19yrs old. Gustavus B. Sampson died on September 8, 1861 at Washington, D.C. from Typhoid Fever at 22yrs old. George H. Sampson died on September 17, 1861 at Alexandria, Virginia from Typhoid Fever at 23yrs old. They are all interred at Crocker Cemetery in St Albans.

"Three brothers named Sampson from St. Albans were in the E Co., 3rd Regiment. One was instantly killed at Bull Run, and the other two have recently died at Washington D. C. of Typhoid Fever." ~ Piscataquis Observer - 17 Oct 1861

Frank took her to a nearby house in Woolrich where a local doctor was summoned but she never regained conscious and died 18 hours later from internal injuries.

*"Opening in 1904, The Maine Sanatorium was the state's first facility for the treatment of tuberculosis. The sanatorium was privately owned until 1915 when it was taken over by the state, along with Chase Memorial Sanatorium in Fairfield. The facilities were renamed the Western Maine Sanatorium and **Central Maine Sanatorium** respectively. People with the best chance of recovery were sent to the Western Maine Sanatorium. Those who were not expected to recover were sent to the Central Maine Sanatorium. Practicing an open air policy, patients slept on porches or in rooms that were open the outdoors. It was believed that fresh air, rest and a proper diet would help aid recovery. Dairy cows, a corn silo, creamery and large farm supplied the food for the facility. The*

sanatorium was also known for its Fourth of July parades, with floats and participants dressed in a variety of costumes. Games were held and the activities were open to participants who were in good health. The sanatorium was closed in July of 1959."

Soon after Sarah's death, Jacob moved to Santa Monica, California and remarried in 1877.

According to "A History of Corinna", it was Dr. Jacob Elliott and his brother David Densmore Stewart who persuaded Levi Merrick Stewart to leave Corinna in 1856 for Minneapolis. Levi soon established his law office there where he amassed his great fortune through his law firm specializing in real estate and his numerous early real estate investments in the city where he was the largest land taxpayer in 1886.

Levi would pay homage to his native home when he had the Levi Stewart Library built in Corinna in the 1890s as a memorial to his parents where his vast private book collection containing over 6,500 volumes is still housed today.

“Minneapolis began as a riverfront outpost in the 1840's when Colonel John Stevens built the first permanent residence. Lakewood Cemetery, now with over 38,000 interments, was established in 1871, four years after Minneapolis was incorporated. The cemetery site was located in what was originally countryside, nestled between Lakes Harriet and Calhoun. By 1895, the Lake Harriet Streetcar brought people to the cemetery from their homes in and around downtown Minneapolis. The fare was a nickel. It has one of the largest cemetery greenhouse operations in the United States. Groundskeepers plant nearly 100,000 flowers each season, including many unusual plant species found nowhere else in the state.”

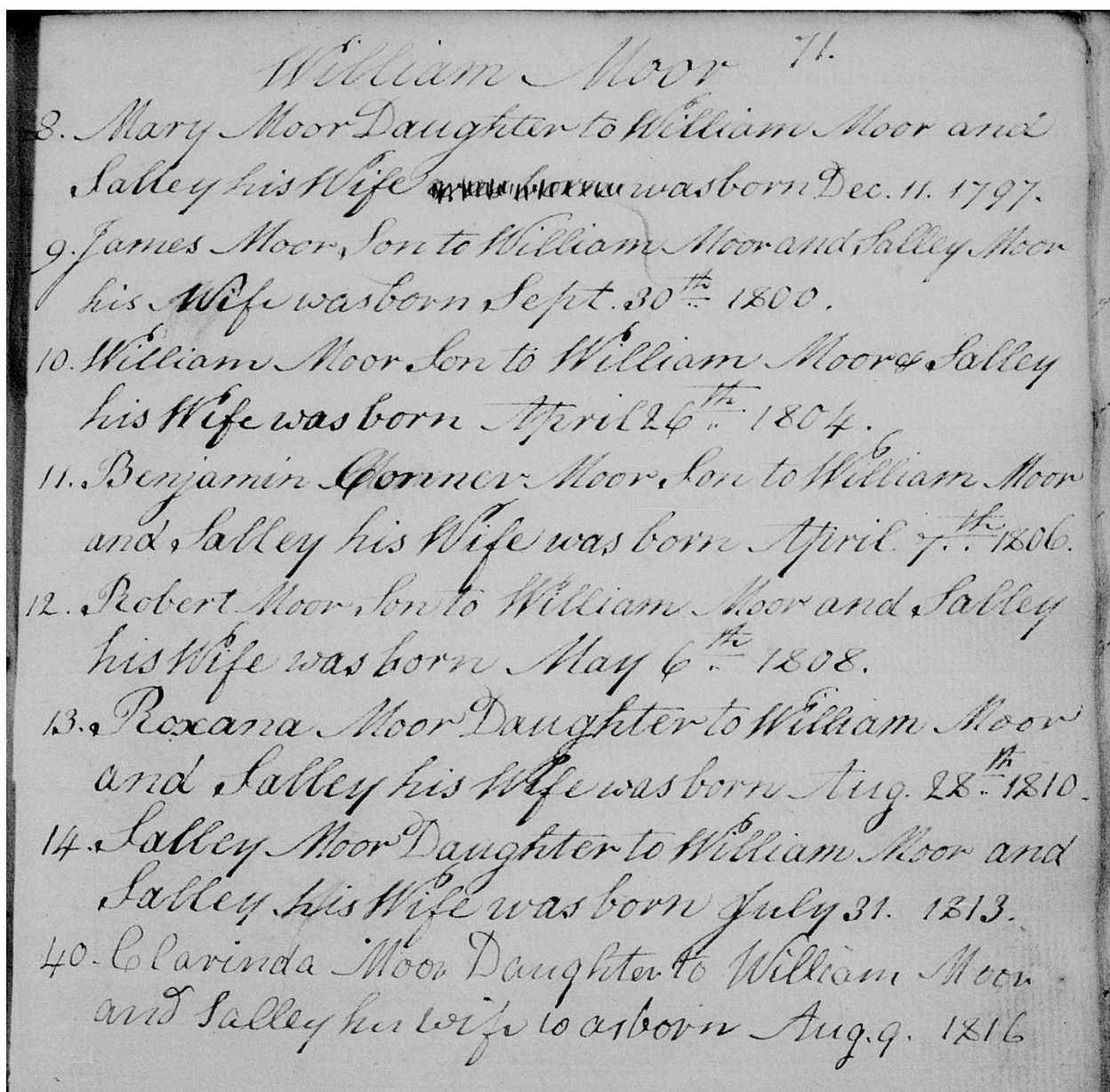
